## INTRODUCTION

**Built:** Work started in late 1881  
**Opened:** 17 July 1882  
**Cornerstone:** Laid 4 January 1882 by Shire  
President Peter Dunn  
**Facade style:** Inspired by Roman Tuscan

The Town Hall was the second Town Hall for Alexandra. The first was built on the same block and was sold at auction prior to works starting on the current Town Hall. The current hall was designed by William Ellerker and built by local Thomas Carison.



The Alexandra Shire Hall is a large hall located in the centre of Alexandra in Central Victoria and opened on 17 July 1882. Its design is inspired by Roman Tuscan and has a Coat of Arms that predates Australia's first Coat of Arms (1908) by 26 years and the second and current Coat of Arms (1912) by 30 years.

Prior to March 1870, a room in the wooden building that previously stood at the same site, was rented as a Clerks Office by the Roads Board. In March 1870 the land and building was purchased for 125 pound by the Shire.

According to Alexandra's first newspaper (*Alexandra Times*, Friday 3 November 1871), Alexandra's first building to act as a 'Town Hall' was a brick structure built by district

pioneer Richard Vining in late 1871. It was located on the same site as the current Town Hall (Allotment 1 Alexandra), was adjacent to the Vining Hotel (located on the site of our current Library building) and was christened '**Alexandra Town Hall**'. It was stated that:

*'When matters of great importance of a moral, social, or political character move the people, may they assemble here in all their majesty and power, and let the rulers of the land hear their voice. And as for the Shire Councillors, if they do not perform their duty, then will the ratepayers gather into this building and censure the President of the Shire Council and all those who act with him.'*

The main hall was described as being 66 feet by 22 feet, and was declared the largest room in Alexandra at that time. It was a small structure that met the initial needs of the growing township and was often referred to as the 'Vining's Athenaeum Hall'. The old building was later described by the Alexandra Times on 24 October 1881 as:

*'There can be no mistake about it now, as the old rookery which has so long done duty as a public house, ball room, library and council chambers, is to be sold to the highest bidder on 5th of November, as the hammer, and must be taken away by the fortunate purchaser.'*

In May 1881 the Shire Council communicated with the well known Melbourne based Collins Street Architect W. H. Ellerker (c1853-1891). He subsequently submitted plans and specifications to the Shire for a large building to replace the former old building (which was used as a town hall from time to time). The new plans were in the Classic Roman Tuscan architectural style.

On 18 October 1881 the Shire accepted a tender from local builder Thomas Carison for £2,214. It was not the cheapest tender submitted, but was the most convincing. Once approval was granted, the old building on the block was sold at auction.

## INTRODUCTION

The foundation stone for the new Town Hall was officially laid on 4 January 1882 by Shire President Peter Dunn Esq. Carison then built the Shire Hall in less than seven months and in a manner that was very pleasing to the Shire.

The new Town Hall was officially opened by the Shire on Monday 17 July 1882 and a Banquet and Grand Ball were held during the evening to celebrate the opening.

In 1955, works to restore and repair the town hall was carried out. During this work, much of the decorative elements that made the Shire Hall so beautiful, was removed.

On 19 January 1976, the Shire Hall and Offices were inspected and a restoration and repair report was prepared for the Shire. The report highlights works needed, presents costs and quotes as well as giving a brief history on the Shire Hall and Architect William Ellerker and builder Thomas Carison.

In 1983 a push by the Shire to have the Town Hall demolished was overturned as a result of overwhelming public opposition to the move. The Shire wanted to demolish and rebuilt at great expense, though it was argued that the needed renovations would be far cheaper than the proposed rebuild. After considerable public pressure, the Shire backed down and the Town Hall was upgraded at a much smaller cost. A damp course was added, the hall was refurbished, the antiquated heating system was replaced, a Council Chamber was built, a veranda added and they re-modelled the toilet area.

In 2009, Artworkz commenced work on this factsheet, and in 2013 we uncovered our first evidence suggesting that the current Town Hall was not the first hall called a 'Town Hall' to be located at Alexandra.

## TIMELINE

**November 1871**

The Foundation Stone of the first Alexandra Town Hall was laid by Mrs Vining. It was adjacent to Vining's Hotel and was often referred to as 'Vining's Athenaeum Hall, though was Christened the "Alexandra Town Hall" by Vining himself upon the laying of the foundation stone.

**16 May 1874**

A second major fire in Grant Street threatened the first wooden Shire Hall opposite. The fire was along the Eldorado series of shops on the western side of Grant Street, on the northern end. The fire claimed the Eldorado Hotel and the Cumming's Albion Hotel amongst others. The then wooden Shire Hall (opposite the Eldorado Hotel) was said to have been under threat from the heat of the fire (Alexandra Times, 23 May 1874).

**May 1881**

The Shire Council communicated with well known Collins Street Architect W. H. Ellerker. He subsequently submitted plans and specifications to the Shire for the building. Plans he drew up have been lost. A tracing of the original plan was prepared by Architect C.E. Wright in 1925 and can be seen later in this factsheet.

**July 1881**

On the eve of calling for tenders for the construction of the Town Hall, a debate arose regarding the proposed site.

**October 1881**

Plans were altered to allow for an upgraded 60 feet hall instead of the first proposed 35 feet hall.

**October 1881**

Tenders were called for to build the Town Hall.

**18 October 1881**

The tender was awarded to Thomas Carison.

**5 November 1881**

The structure that was Alexandra's first Town Hall was sold at auction.

**November 1881**

The contract to build Alexandra's second Town Hall was awarded to Thomas Carison (often miss-spelt Carrison) at a cost of £2,214.



## TIMELINE

- December 1881** Construction on Alexandra's second and current Town Hall commenced.
- February 1882** The construction of the Town Hall was reported as being well under way.
- April 1882** A motion was passed at a monthly Council Meeting that the Shire Hall be opened with a Banquet and Ball, with the ticket price being £1, 1s for both and 15s for the Ball. It was also passed that pricing for fencing and furniture supplied to the Shire by the contractor Thomas Carison be accepted.
- May 1882** Thomas Carison granted a four week extension of time to allow for completion of various additional works, including the construction of a stage at the eastern end of the hall.
- 7 July 1882** A detailed description of the new Town Hall was given in the Alexandra and Yea Standard. It included a description of the circular Coat of Arms located in the pediment, moulded by Mr Scurry of Melbourne and the tiled floor. It was stated that the total cost for all building and fittings was £2,769.
- 17 July 1882** A substantial ball was held and the Shire Hall officially opened.
- Unknown** The iron fencing surrounding the front of the Town Hall was removed. It is not known what happened to it.
- 1916** Renovation works were carried out to the hall. (*Alexandra & Yea Standard*, Friday 30 June 1916).
- 1925** A new supper room, offices and stage were constructed. The architect was C. Ernest Wright of 443 Collins Street, Melbourne and the builder was Ferguson and Payne.

## TIMELINE

- 1955** Some restoration work was carried out on the Shire Hall. Most of the decorative elements were removed at this time. It is not know exactly why this occurred, though it may have been that it were considered a financial burned to keep them. Australia was going through a financial crisis around this time and money for such projects was scarce.
- 1956** The exterior was painted with impervious gloss paints and interior redecorations.
- 1957** Fillings around exterior of the hall and s=construction of perimeter brick drain to south wall of hall/
- 1960** Extension of stage on north side and construction of exit steps.
- 1969** Painting of interior and exterior of the Shire Hall.
- 1970c** The Coat or Arms was painted in colour. From analysis of early black and white images circa 1900, it is clear that the colours did not exactly match the early colours used when first coloured.
- 19 January 1976** The Shire Hall and offices were inspected. A report into the condition of the Shire was prepared by the Shire and a copy of the report remains today with the Shire. The report highlights works needed, presents costs and quotes as well as giving a brief history on the Shire Hall.
- 22 June 1976** Drysat Pty Ltd inspected the fabric of the building.
- 23 July 1976** F. G. James Pty Ltd inspected the building.
- Unknown** Sometime between 2002 and 2009 the Town Hall was painted a cream colour and the colour colours of the Coat or Arms was painted over.

## TIMELINE

- 2009** Artworkz commenced this Factsheet.
- 29 November 2016** Artworkz were made aware of a 1976 report on the Alexandra Library Restoration. It talked of the condition of the shire hall and proposals to restore it. The book included plans and a number of photographs we had not seen before, including two from around the 1900s.
- 29 November 2016** Solid plastering and restoration specialist Simon Nygaard spoke at Artworkz HistoryCafe on the Shire Hall, Post Office and Library buildings.
- 30 November 2016** Simon Nygaard attended ArtworkzBreakfast to talk further on our old buildings.
- 5 December 2016** Minor repair work was conducted on a wall in the front northern room by Simon Nygaard of ABODE Restorations. The rendering was almost sand-like in places and falling away.
- 8 January 2018** Artworkz conducted a photoshoot of the Sydney Bank of New South Wales, which is one of just a handful of buildings in Australia with a Coat of Arms with the emu on the left.

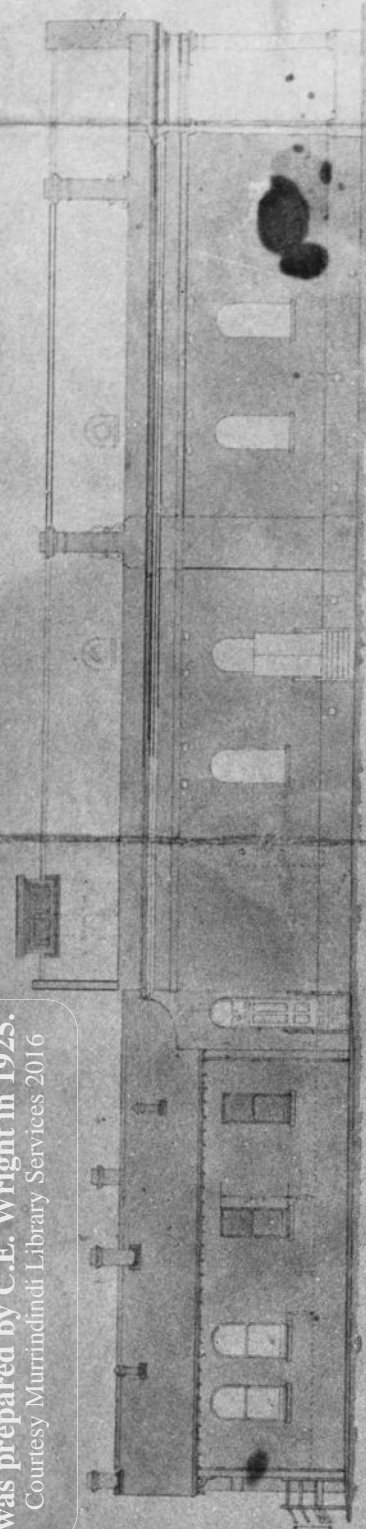
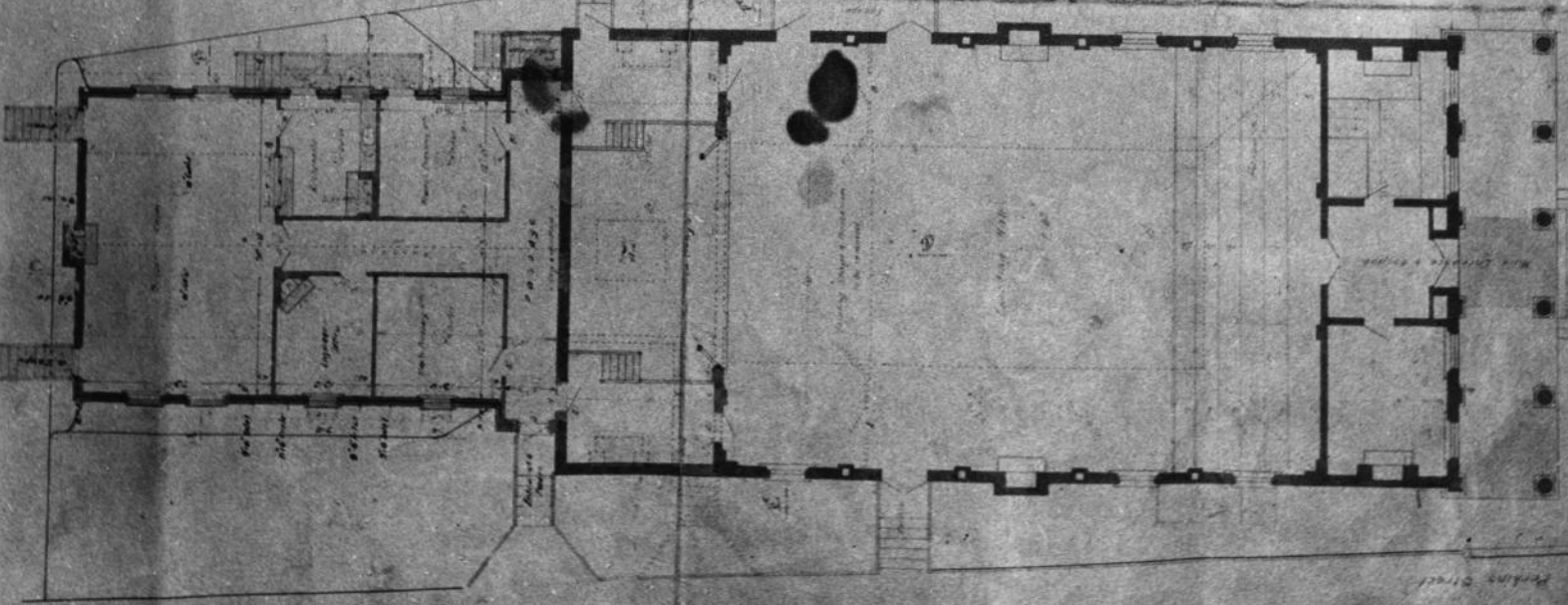

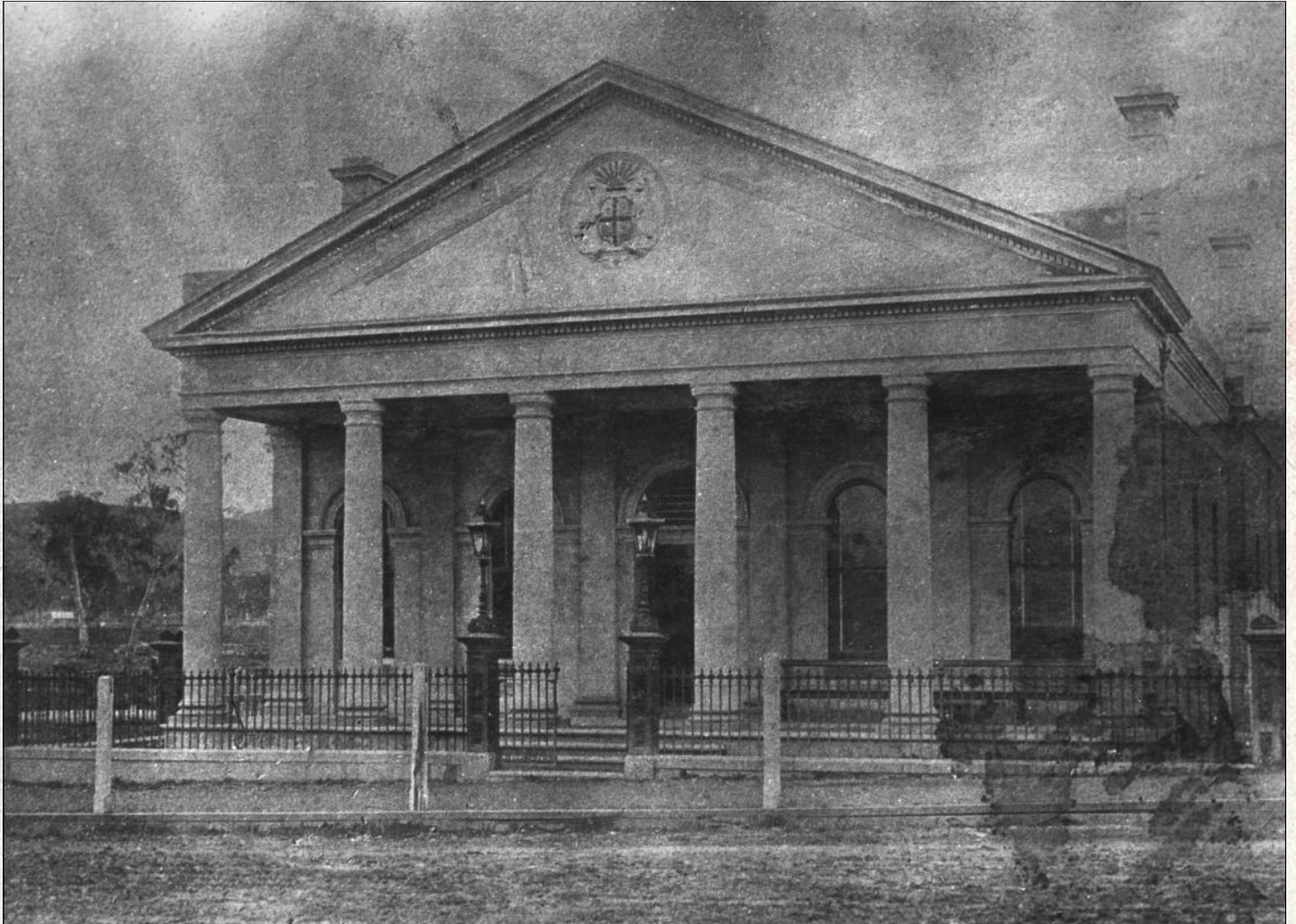

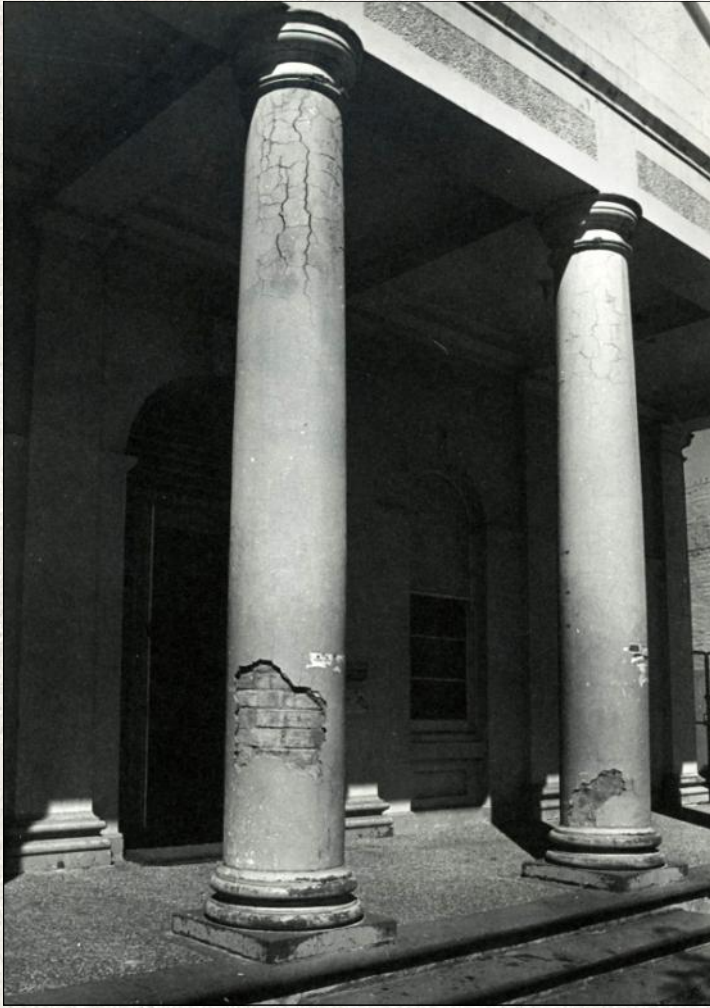

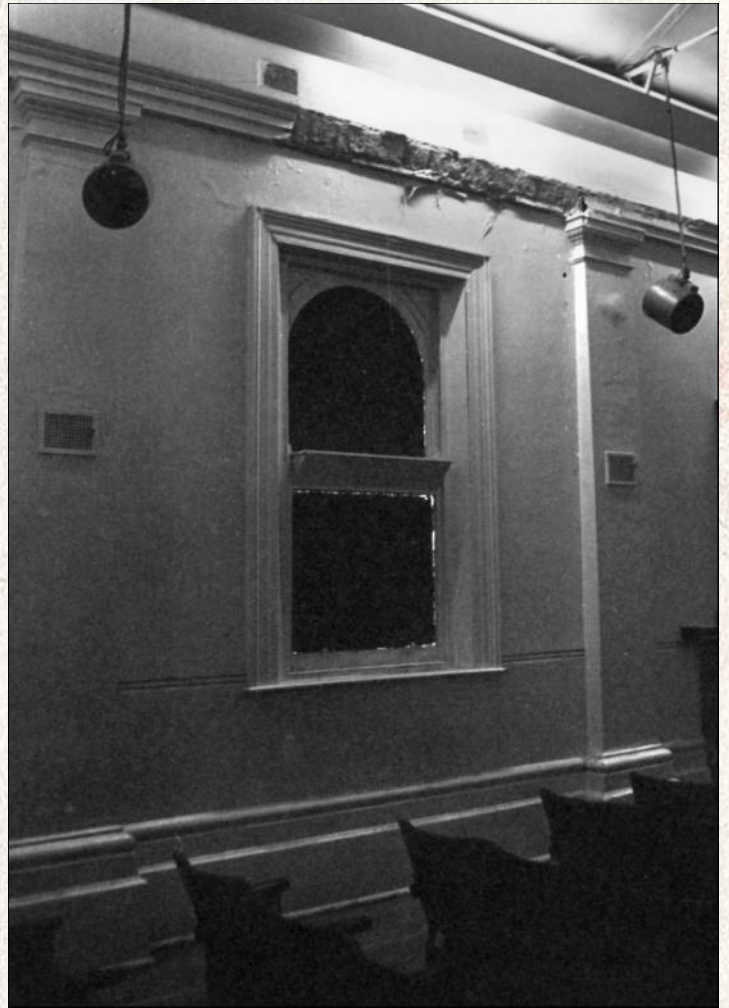

So we are likely to have a building capable of containing our large population on important occasions. Mr Vining has laid the foundation of a building of which one room will be 64 x 22 ft. So far so good. This will be the largest room in Alexandra. The building is to be of brick and the foundation stone. Mrs Vining in laying the foundation stone said, "I christen this building the Alexandra Town Hall, and may the work now commenced be carried on in order and in a workmanlike manner, and when matters of great importance of a moral, social, or political character move the people, may they assemble here in all their majesty and power, and let the rulers of the land hear their voice. And as for the Shire Councillors, if they do not perform their duty, then will the ratepayers gather into this building and censure the President of the Shire Council and all those who act with him." (Cheers.) After this the party returned to Mr Vining's, and partook of an excellent luncheon provided by that gentleman.

### THE ALEXANDRA ATHENÆUM.

The formal opening of this commodious and substantial building took place on Monday night last by a grand amateur performance. The large hall was densely crowded, and many who had purchased tickets were unable to obtain admittance. There certainly has never been such a gathering in Alexandra for numbers and respectability. The hall is 150 feet in length and 30 feet in breadth, the walls being of brick and the roof of iron. The acoustic properties of the house are remarkably good. The walls have been ornamented with paintings on the plaster of parrots, flowers, &c., giving a pleasant, lively appearance to the main body of the building. A commodious stage with wing walls has been erected, and a neat proscenium. The scenery has been got up with great taste and ability, certainly far superior to anything of the kind we have ever seen out of Melbourne. The storm at sea, the ships, boats, thunder, lightning, and numerous other effects were remarkably good, and called forth the admiration and wonder of the audience. Mr Charles Humea, who painted the scenery, has a remarkable taste and talent for this kind of art.

#### DESTRUCTIVE FIRE IN GRANT STREET.

The township has again suffered from a destructive conflagration, and each block of our main street has now been visited in turn by the devouring element.

Beyond Vining's hotel stood the Athenæum Hall, a large brick building, which from the intense heat caught fire in several places, and at one time seemed in great danger, being so full of smoke that it was impossible to enter. Everything was at last removed but the mere shell, and copious doses of water were well applied till the danger was over, though the beams and rafters beneath the iron roof were charred and shrivelled by the heat. The wooden structure at the back used as dressing rooms was partly torn down, and a considerable expenditure will be required to put the hall in order again. Very little could be saved from Vining's, as the fire spread so quickly, the billiard-table, stock, and most of the furniture being lost. Of Vining's and Williams's premises nothing was left standing but the blackened chimneys, and the destruction was all accomplished perhaps within half an hour.

Mr Carison, the contractor for the Hall, supplied the Council with the particulars and prices of fencing and furniture. Iron fencing for the front and partially round one side of the building, with double gates, blue stone cap, brick and concrete foundations, would cost £150; a large table for the main hall, with 10 drawers, £18; smaller cedar table, £7; 34 forms at £4, £136. These items amounted to £311. Chairs could be obtained at all prices. The stage he thought should be left to the architect.

After discussion, it was decided, on the motion of the President, seconded by Cr Wheeler—That Mr Carison's offer be accepted at the prices mentioned, subject to specifications, to be submitted by him to a committee meeting the following Wednesday, being approved of. Mr Carison was also requested to obtain patterns and price lists of chairs before the next ordinary day of meeting:

### OPENING CEREMONY.

Cr Wheeler moved, and Cr Wightman seconded—That the opening of the Shire Hall be celebrated by a banquet and ball, tickets to admit to both to be £1 1s; for ball only 15s.

The motion was carried.

It was resolved that Mr T. Hunt, M.L.A., and several members of the Ministry should be invited to be present on the occasion, and the meeting then adjourned.

### THE NEW SHIRE HALL.

Now that our new Shire Hall is completed, it will interest our readers to place before them a few remarks in reference to the building, and the reason for its erection. For several years it was felt that a new hall was absolutely necessary, the building formerly used being a most dilapidated and unsightly structure, and in every respect unsuitable for the purpose. After giving the subject much thought and consideration, the council, in May 1881, communicated with Mr W. H. Ellerker, the well-known architect of Collins street, Melbourne, who submitted plans and specifications of the proposed building. These were approved of, but on the eve of calling for tenders, objection was taken to the site, with the result that action was deferred until after the annual election the following August, when the ratepayers decided by a large majority of votes in favor of the present site, which is the same upon which the old building formerly stood. In October, the plan having been meanwhile altered so as to make the main hall 60 feet long in place of 35 feet, as originally drawn, tenders were called for, and on the 18th of the same month, the tender of Mr Thomas Carison was accepted for the sum of £2,213 11s 9d. There have been no extras upon the building, but special contracts have since been let to Mr Carison for a stage, seats, chairs, iron railing, drainage, &c., bringing the total cost up to £2,760. The following is the description of the building. The architecture may be called "Classical-Italian." The portico facing Grant-street occupies the full frontage of the building, and is approached by a flight of stone steps. It has six Doric columns, 22½ inches in diameter; the pediment is dentilled, and in the centre, in a circular moulded panel, are the Australian Arms, modelled by Mr Scurry, of Melbourne. The floor is tiled, and between each column are semi-circular headed windows, the centre opening having the main entrance door. The side to the U.T. Creek is cemented, similar to the principal elevation, and has an entrance to the rate collector's office and committee-room. Entering by the main entrance through the lobby, which is 11 feet 3 inches wide, the secretary's office is on the right, and the engineers on the left; both rooms are 15 feet by 12 feet, and 15 feet 6 inches high, with cornices, and flowers at ceilings. The large hall is 60 feet long and 42 feet 9 inches wide.

It is divided and ornamented by pilasters set in Keen's cement, with moulded caps and bases, and handsome cornice, frieze, and architrave. The ceiling is wagon-shaped, and boarded, for acoustical purposes; the height in the centre is 21 feet 6 inches, whilst to the top of the cornice it is 16 feet. The iron tie-rods to the principals show below the boarded ceiling, and will be found useful for suspending flags or other decorations when required. The hall is lighted by eight circular-headed windows. There are two fireplaces, and cemented dado and skirting all round the walls. Ample inlet ventilation is provided on the Tiffin system through the plasters and louvres in skylight over the doors, while for the outlet ventilation there are three T gals iron tubes, communicating with louvres on the outside of the roof. There are zinc discs hung below the ceiling to prevent any possibility of down draught. This is the system introduced by Mr Ellerker in the State School, Lee street, Carlton, which is acknowledged to be one of the best ventilated schools in the colony. At the end of the hall, a handsome stage, 26 feet by 15 feet, has been erected, which will prove of inestimable service for public meetings and performances. The acoustic properties of the hall appear to be excellent. Immediately at the back of the hall is the committee-room, 30 feet by 15 feet, and 15 feet 6 inches high; there is also the rate collector's room, 12 feet by 10 feet 9 inches, and both have handsome cornices and centre flowers, and are well ventilated. The roof is covered with the best Bangor slates. The iron railing was supplied by Messrs Philips and McWalters, of the Victorian Foundry, Melbourne, and is a good specimen of casting.

We understand the Councillors are perfectly satisfied with the manner in which Mr W. H. Ellerker has carried out the work, without having given any trouble to them, and without involving them in any extras—a most unusual thing—and they have invited that gentleman to the banquet and ball to be given on the occasion of opening the hall. In conclusion we must not omit a word of praise to Mr Carison, who has carried out the work—as he always does—in the most satisfactory manner, and given general satisfaction. The ratepayers of this Shire have now a hall second to none in the Eastern district, and we feel sure that they will never regret having erected their new Shire Hall.

### A description of the Town Hall.

Of note is that it mentions that the new Town Hall is located on the same site as the first Town Hall. It also mentions that the Coat of Arms was created as a part of the original plans.

The ventilation system was based on the ventilation system previously introduced at a Carlton State School, which was known at the time as being one of the best ventilated schools in the colony.

### Opening of the New Shire Hall.

The new **Alexandra Shire Hall**, of which we gave a full description in a recent issue, was formally opened on Monday last. The weather fortunately proved propitious, the sun shining brightly forth, and adding brilliancy to the animated scene. Shortly after mid-day, the township began to wear a holiday appearance, and people commenced flocking in from all directions. The Corner Hotel, as usual on occasions of a festive nature, was gaily decorated with bunting, while from other buildings an occasional flag was to be seen waving in the breeze. About 2 o'clock the **Alexandra Brass Band**, under the leadership of Mr. F. Scoral, took up its position on the balcony of the Corner Hotel, and discoursed inspiring music to the crowd which had by this time gathered in the street, and soon afterwards, a cavalcade consisting of about a hundred horsemen, and several buggies filled with occupants, with Mr. Peter Dunn, the president of the Shire, at the head, started out to meet the *special coach* containing the Ministerial and Parliamentary guests. The people of Yea having taken advantage of the occasion to offer their welcome to the visitors, Alexandra was not reached until a later hour than was anticipated, and it was half-past four when the coach, attended by its imposing escort, drove into the town. On alighting at the Corner Hotel, the visitors were greeted with three ringing cheers by the assembled crowd, the Band also lending its aid to swell the hearty welcome. After a brief delay, a start was made for the hall, and the visitors were shown through the various rooms, appearing greatly pleased at what they saw.

In striking comparison to the paltry state school here is the Shire Hall. This magnificent building attracts the attention of every stranger. It is the finest of its kind out of Melbourne.

The main hall is 75ft by 40ft, with a splendid Stage scenery and dressingrooms. Behind this is a council chamber and rooms where Masons meet and offices of the shire, where Mr Moon (the secretary) and Mr Alston (the rate collector) hatch their schemes against the pockets of taxpayers.

The Alexandra Shire Council of nine, of which the present president is Mr Thomas Carison, of Alexandra, are naturally proud of the grand building they own.

The rateable value of the property in the shire is about £20,000. I do not think the council is in debt, but they have a good asset in their Shire Hall

### DEATH OF A ST. KILDA EX- MAYOR.

#### The Late Mr. W. H. Ellerker.

To-day we have to announce the demise of another old identity and a former representative of the St. Kilda council, in the person of Mr. William Henry Ellerker, J.P., the well known architect, who died on Monday last at his late residence in Crimea-street, St. Kilda. The deceased gentleman had been in delicate health for some time past and the sad event was not unexpected. The funeral which took place on Wednesday at the Melbourne General Cemetery was very largely attended, the deceased being a prominent Mason and Orangeman, a large number of members of those institutions taking part, general sympathy for the bereaved relatives and regret at the loss of so respected a citizen being expressed.

The St. Kilda council at its meeting on Wednesday evening ordered a letter of condolence to be forwarded to Mrs. Ellerker expressive of sympathy with her in her bereavement.

Mr. Ellerker was born in England and came to this colony in 1853, entering the office of Mr. Thomas Kemp, the well-known Melbourne architect, a few weeks after his arrival. After a long residence in South Melbourne, he settled in St. Kilda where he had resided for many years, always taking an active interest in local affairs. For three years he filled the position of correspondent of the local board of advice, and in 1884 was elected a councillor of the borough for the North ward. In the following year he was unanimously elected mayor, and carried out the important duties appertaining to that office with satisfaction. During his tenure of office occurred the settlement of the contract with the Government for erecting the new Prince's-bridge, Mr. Ellerker signing the engagement on behalf of his council to pay £10,000 towards its erection; and also the arrangement by which Albert Park was handed over in perpetuity to the councils of South Melbourne and St. Kilda and the Board of Land and Works, thus preventing any more sales of land in that fine park, Mr. Ellerker, with the late Cr. Johnston, being elected as the first trustees on behalf of St. Kilda. After Mr.

Ellerker's term of office was over, he was presented by his brother councillors with a beautifully illuminated address in appreciation of his services, and in 1886 he was gazetted a justice of the peace for the central bailiwick. In March of that year he visited Europe, the tour occupying thirteen months. In 1857 he was elected an associate of the original institute of architects in Melbourne, then a member, and afterwards a Fellow of the present institute, and during his trip to England had the honor of being elected a Fellow of the Royal Institute of British Architects. In 1863 he went to Queensland, remaining there three years, during which time designs were invited for the Queensland Houses of Parliament; tenders were called for four of the designs considered most worthy, and that of Mr. Ellerker's was recommended by a royal commission, together with the tender of Mr. C. Beauchamp for adoption, but the Government having by the advice of the colonial architect altered its views and determined to erect all public offices in the same building, Mr. Ellerker's design was not carried out. In 1866 he returned to Melbourne, where he had been in business ever since.

Amongst his works are the Temperance, Horticultural, and Protestant hall, Melbourne; the Carlton Hall erected by Mr. Munro, the Premier, which was commenced and in three weeks the walls were up, the roof on, and Mr. Munro, who had been refused all the large rooms in the district during an election campaign, spoke in it, and was subsequently elected by a large majority. The residences of the Hon. the Speaker (Sir M. H. Davies); the Premier, the Hon. Jas. Munro, M.P., Armadale; the Hon. C. H. James, Toorak; and the late Mr. B. Gibson, Royal Park, are all monuments to Mr. Ellerker's skill and taste as an architect.

## WILLIAM HENRY ELLERKER

### Architect and Designer of the Alexandra Town Hall



William Henry Ellerker was born in England and migrated to Victoria in 1853. He took a position with architect Thomas Kemp and afterwards with Knight, Kemp and Kerr, Architects for the design and construction of the Houses of Parliament in Melbourne. Ellerker was elected to the Institute of Architects in 1857 and transferred his employment that same year to the Public Works and Railways Department in Victoria. He travelled to Queensland in 1863, working there for three years in which time he won the competition for the design of the new Queensland Houses of Parliament. The Queensland Government later altered its opinion of the winning design and shelved the project.

He returned to Melbourne in 1866 and practised in Victoria until he retired in the late 1800s. He is remembered for a long distinguished career and for designing many notable buildings. These include the Temperance Hall, Horticultural Hall and Protestant Hall in Melbourne, as well as the Carlton Hall. The Federal Hotel (formerly the Federal Coffee Palace) in Melbourne was also attributed to him (amongst others). William is noted in the book *Victoria and Metropolis* written by A.P. Sutherland for being 'employed by many eminent citizens and politicians to design substantial mansions in Melbourne and the country'. Notably for central Victoria, he designed the Alexandra Shire Hall.

In 1885, William entered into partnership with E.G. Kilburn and the practice continued to flourish in the book years of 1885-92.

After some dispute regarding the proposed location (which held up the project for a month) and after some last minute alterations to the plans to extend the length hall from the 35 feet to 60 feet, tenders were called for.

# HISTORIC FACTSHEET

## COAT OF ARMS REVERSED

The Alexandra Shire Hall is adorned with the “Coat or Arms”, the Kangaroo and Emu distinctively showcasing two of our prominent and amazing animals while the coat of arms shows our relationship with Mother England.

On the Australian Coat of Arms created for federation in 1901, the Kangaroo is on the left and the Emu on the right (top right).

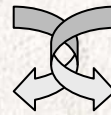
The Alexandra Shire Hall Coat of Arms (bottom right) has the Kangaroo and Emu reversed, indicating it was created before federation in 1901.

A slight change was made to the Australian Coat of Arms in 1912 to represent each state and address some small concerns.

The current Australian 50 cent piece shows the current coat of arms on our Australian Tender with the Kangaroo on the left which has been normal since 1901.

Interestingly, the 'Bowman Flag' emblem created in 1806 in New South Wales by John and Honor Bowman, bears a striking resemblance to the Alexandra Town Hall Coat of Arms. It was painted using oil paints on silk material from Honor's wedding dress, and was a part of the inspiration for Australia's Coat of Arms.

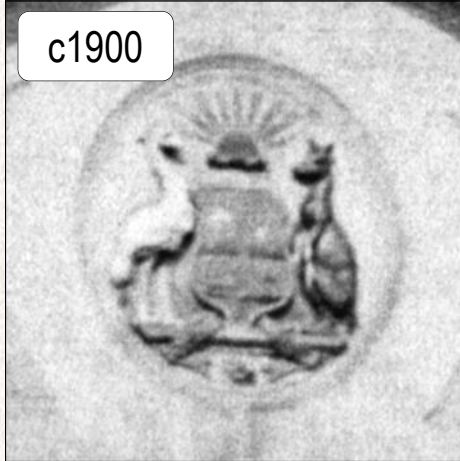

## COAT OF ARMS SHEILD SYMBOLS



The Golden Fleece is representative of animal based farming Industry, and especially the wool industry which was a foundation of the early colony.

The sheaf of wheat represents the Agricultural Industry.

The sailing ship represents Sea Trade (import and export industry) and early immigration.

The shovel and pick represents the Mining and the construction Industry.

The shield is representative of power and protection. The four elements are seen to protect and empower the early colony.

## KEYSTONE MASK

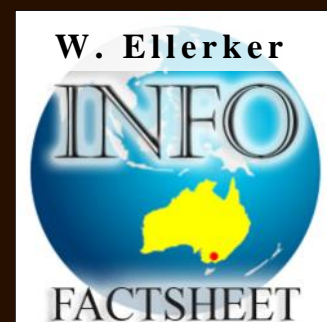


William Henry Ellerker (1853-1891) was the Architect responsible for the plans and construction of the Alexandra Shire Town Hall. He was likely also behind the keystone mask above the door of the Town Hall.

It is not currently known whose face this is and what it is meant to represent. The current thinking is that the face may be that of :

1. **Janus**  
The Roman god who protected doorways and gateways. He had two faces, one looking forward and the other facing backward (as a door has two faces).
2. **Portunes**  
The Roman god of keys, doors and livestock. He protected the warehouses where grain was stored.

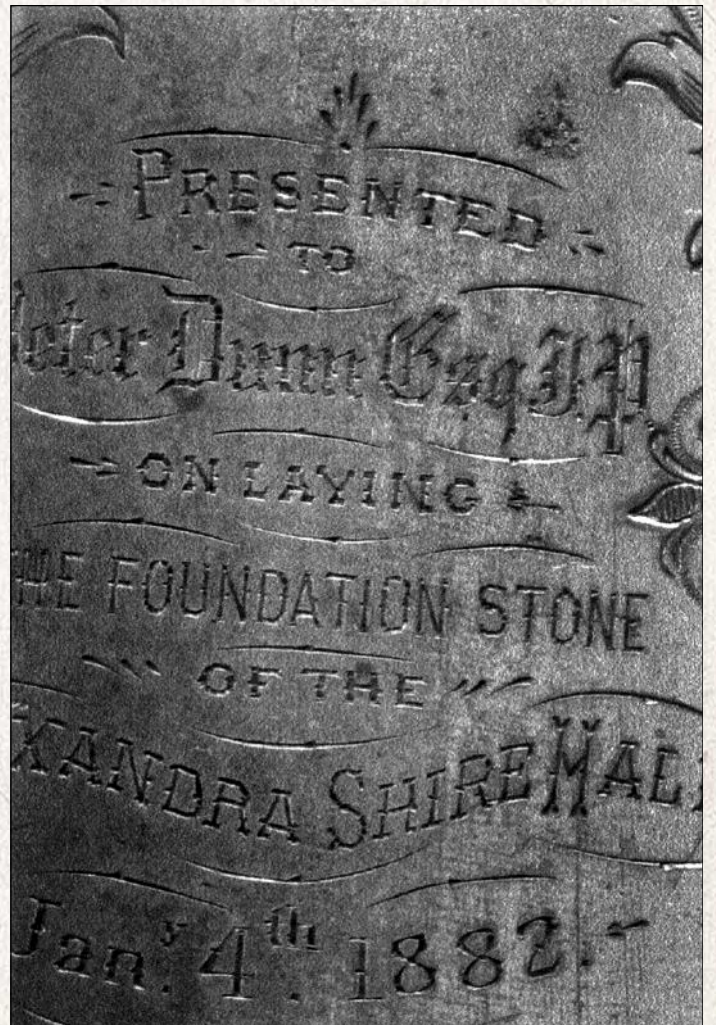
## SHIRE HALL FOUNDATION STONE



The discrepancy between the date on the Foundation Stone laid at the front door of the Shire Hall and the date on the trowel used to lay it, is shown. It is believed that a hold up with the laying of the stone led to the discrepancy. On Friday 30 December 1881 the Alexandra & Yea Standard newspaper reported that the laying of the foundation stone would be conducted on the following Wednesday, thereby confirming the 1882 date as the official date of the laying of the stone.



The trowel was presented to Shire President Peter Dunn Esp J.P. in recognition of him laying the foundation stone of the Alexandra Shire Hall January (4 January 1882). It is currently held by his descendants. The Dunn Family were district pioneers and large contributors to public affairs locally.

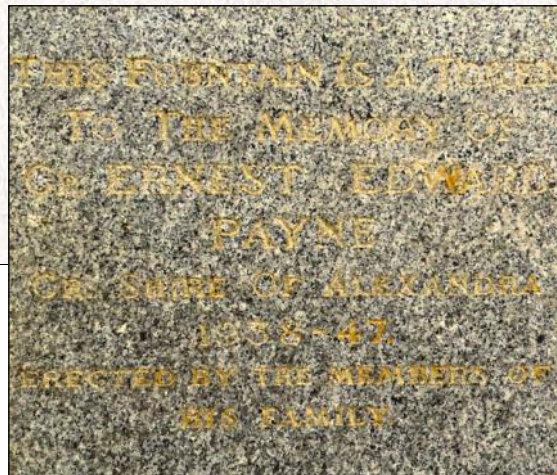

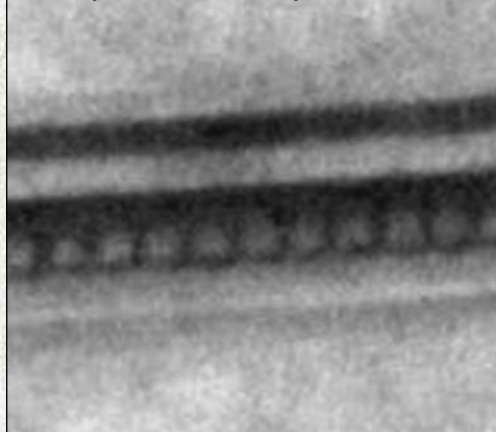
The Alexandra Shire Hall located in Grant Street Alexandra has had its fascia significantly altered from its original design. Many of the original design elements were replaced with more generic decorative elements in 1955. This was done during a period where the Shire Hall was in need of repairs and costs were higher than the Shire could cope with. The high maintenance elements were removed and replaced with more generic elements.

Dentils are closely and evenly spaced rectangular blocks used as decorative elements in early architecture. Often associated with the classical Roman and Greek architecture and the neoclassical (Greek Revival) architecture, they were often molded below the cornice of a building, just below the roofline. Though they were also found in other areas of a building's design such as the portico (the roof over a porch leading to the entrance of a building) held up by as seen on pictures of the early Alexandra Shire Hall.

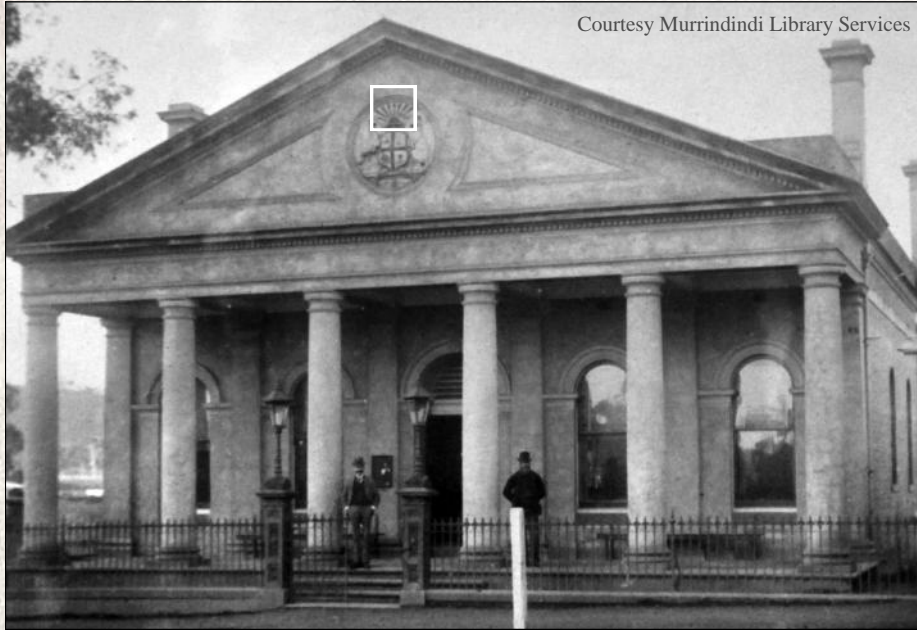

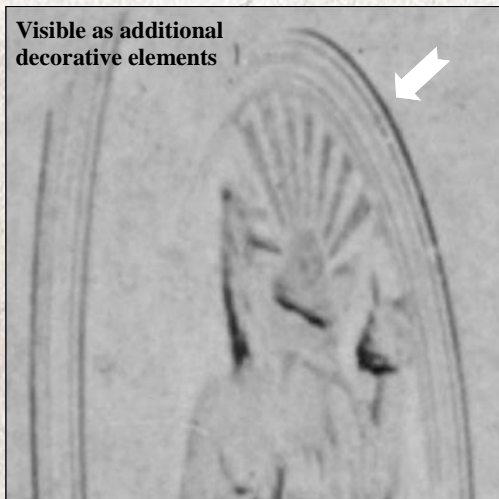

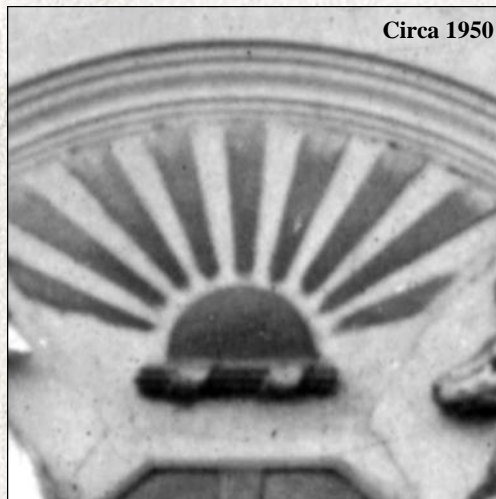

The Alexandra Shire Hall located in Grant Street, Alexandra, has had its fascia significantly altered from its original design. Many of the original design elements were replaced with generic decorative elements in 1955. This was during a period where the Shire Hall was in need of significant repairs and the maintenance costs were deemed too high. Therefore the high maintenance elements were removed and replaced with lower cost elements.

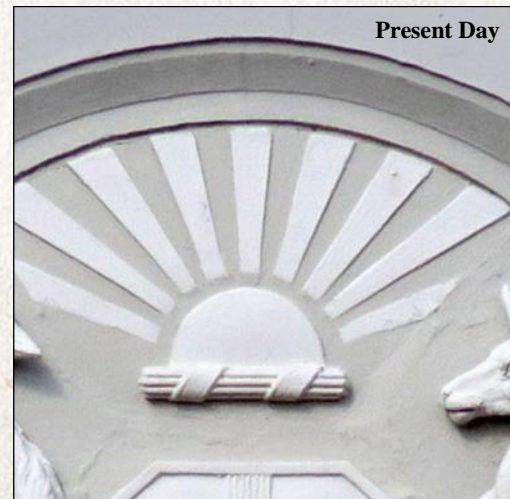
The decorative panel moldings located around the inserted decorative Coat of Arms once featured evenly spaced lines used in early architecture. This was associated with the classical Roman and Greek architecture and the neoclassical (Greek Revival) architecture. These were used around inserted panels to create a decorative effect. This simple and effective design element was often seen in other areas of a building's design, and was cheap and easy to create. Below are some images showing the early Alexandra Shire Hall insert panel. Today the insert panel is smooth (right image).

## NOTES

- The first Town Hall in Alexandra was built by Richard (Dick) Vining, and was often referred to as 'Vining's Athenaeum Hall. It was Christened the "Alexandra Town Hall" by Vining himself upon the laying of the foundation stone in 1871 and served many purposes akin to a those of a Town Hall.
- The Foundation Stone at the front door says “ERECTED A.D. 1881”, yet was actually laid 4 January 1882 by Peter Dunn Esq due to an unknown hold up.
- The current Shire Hall was built to conform with a "Classic Italian" Architecture.
- Shire Hall building was at the time the greatest single building costing for the Alexandra Shire.
- The current Shire Hall originally had a tiled floor.
- The current Shire Hall was built with a then state-of-the-art ventilation system, that was previously used at a Carlton State School. This school was regarded as having one of the best ventilation systems in the colony at that time.
- In the 1980s the then Shire Council attempted to have the Town Hall demolished. A public outcry saw them reverse their idea and led to the Shire upgrading the structure instead.
- In 2012, the Alexandra Cinema closed for good. The cinema had for many decades operated out of the Town Hall successfully, though changes in entertainment technology and the way people watch movies saw a significant decline in patronage. A renewed attempt was made to bring the cinema back and this has been successful to date.
- The Coat or Arms were called the "Australian Arms' and were modelled by Mr Scully of Melbourne.
