Name: Patrick (Paddy) Perkins


Born: 10 October 1838

Migrated: To Victoria, Australia in 1855

Died: 17 May 1901 at Hawthorn (63)

Known for: Castlemaine XXXX beer

Patrick once lived at Woods Point, and with his brother Thomas, they were the inventors of the well known Castlemaine XXXX Beer brand. Patrick was also the first Major of Woods Point.



Early life

Patrick (Paddy) Perkins was born in 1838 at Tipperary, Ireland, second son of Thomas Perkins (farmer) and Ellen (née) Gooley. He migrated with his family to Victoria, Australian in 1855 and was successful in working the Ballarat Goldfields with his brother Thomas. In 1859, Patrick and Thomas purchased an single £8,000 share allotment in the Reedy Creek mine. Two years later in 1861, Patrick married Ellen Mary Hickey to whom he had eight children (four boys and four girls).

Woods Point Brewery

Around this time he moved to Jamieson in Central Victoria where his Uncle William Gooley resided. William had been the first to discover gold near Woods Point when he found gold in a creek near Woods Point in 1861. The creek was later named in his honour (Gooley Creek).

He and his brother Thomas also opened the 'Perkins Brewery' at Woods Point. It is here that it seems that the Perkin Brothers first introduced the X branding, with the production and sale of the 'Barclay and Perkins's XXX Stout'. In those days it was popular by brewers to use the X rating system to donate alcoholic strength.



INTRODUCTION

It was at Woods Point that Patrick made the news in 1863 when another man was charged with embezzlement against the Perkins Company 'Perkins & Co'.

In 1864, in an article titled 'Woods Point Mania' written by a correspondent for *The Age* Newspaper, it described how at Woods Point a glass of Perkin's Colonial Beer cost one shilling per glass. (*The Star Newspaper of Ballarat*, Friday 8 April 1864).

In 1865, Patrick became Major for Woods Point and in 1866 acted as Major to promote the Governments position on a tariff that related to the Appropriation Act and Land Act.



Toowoomba

During 1866 Patrick and Thomas visited Toowoomba in Queensland. Three years later they opened Queensland's first brewery (14 December 1869) there. In 1872 they expanded their enterprise by purchasing the City Brewery located in Mary Street Brisbane. His brother Thomas managed the Queensland businesses while Patrick continued his affairs in our District. The Queensland business quickly expanded to Brisbane after they took over the City Brewery in Mary Street, Brisbane. Their Castlemaine XXXX beer hit the spot with the Queensland drinkers, and quickly become one of the more popular beers in the state.

In August 1868, while brother Thomas managed the Queensland affairs, Perkins, a councillor of Woods Point, retired via rotation, along with prominent local John Whitelaw. In that same year Mr H Perkins built the Thornton Hotel, which became the Baudewig Hotel circa 1875.

Passage refused

Patrick Perkins was still in the District in 1872 when the *Alexandra Times* (Saturday 7 December 1872 and Saturday 14 December 1872) described an incident involving him and John Whitelaw. Two articles describe how when riding in the Cobb & Co Mail Coach, his friend (newly elected candidate Mr Whitelaw) was refused passage over the Goulburn River by an angry Mr Knowles. His travelling companion was Patrick Perkins, and he was allowed passage using a small boat.



INTRODUCTION

Death of Thomas

On Saturday 26 August 1876, it was reported in the *Alexandra Times newspaper* that Queensland brewer Mr Thomas Perkins (formerly of Jamieson) had died (aged 35) after a fall from his horse. Patrick was in Queensland at the time of his brothers death. Soon afterwards in that same year Patrick Perkins moved to Brisbane to take control of the brewery businesses. In an article written in the *Alexandra Times dated* Saturday 2 September 1876, it was noted that both brothers had made a significant mark in relation to the promotion of mining locally.

Politics and Employment

The following year (1877) Patrick entered the Legislative Council as member for Aubigny, at Darling Downs, a position he lost in 1884 due to election irregularities.

In 1879, Perkins became Secretary for the Public Lands Department (a position he held until 1883). He was a hard working minister, though lacked wisdom and benevolence which resulted in him earning a reputation for a short temper and inability to receive criticism. A drunken tirade cost him dearly amongst his supporters and his leader and his involvement in the notorious Peak Downs affair saw his reputation damaged further. Eventually his behaviour cost him a position in the new Ministry of 1888. His tenacity saw him run and win Cambooya in 1888, though in 1893 he didn't contest the seat. He was appointed to the Legislative Council on the 23 May 1893, a position he held this position until his death.

During his political life, he floated a company called 'Perkins & Co' in 1888. The business strategy saw him combine a brewery with a hotel business with limited success. Thought this was also the start of a period of numerous financial failings that threatened his financial security.

Patrick died of Bronchial Pneumonia on Friday 17 May 1901 at Hawthorn, where he had been living for three months. In his will, £100 was left to the Riverview College, £250 to other charities, and his wife received the rest of the estate, valued at £4,000.

Castlemaine Perkins Pty Ltd

In 1928 the brewery was taken over by the Castlemaine Brewery, which had been established in Queensland in 1878 by the Fitzgerald brothers. The merged company was named the Castlemaine Perkins Pty Ltd.



EMBI ZZLEMENT.

Valentine Persse was then charged with embezzling three separate sums of money, the property of his employers, Patrick Perkins and William Taylor.

It appeared from the evidence that the prisoner kept a store on the Red Jacket for his employers, Messrs. Perkins and Co., of the Jamieson, and that it was his duty to enter up every evening the amount received during the day, and transmit the money and gold to his employers when opportunity offered. In the evidence it came out that the prisoner was in the habit of entering three or four days' receipts at one time, and that as far as was shewn by the evidence, that this offence had been condoned on several occasions by the Prisoner now alleged that the money firm. mid to be unaccounted for was included in other days' receipts, and the principal witness, Mr. Thomas Persins, was unable, from the books produced, to rebut the statement.

His Honor said there was no case to go to the jury, and directed a verdict of acquittal, which was returned accordingly, and the prisoner discharged.

WOOD'S POINT.

The first meeting of the councillors of this borough was held at the temporary council chambers, Bridge-street, on Wainesday, July 26, when s'I the councillors took the oath and their seats, with the exception of Mr. John Whitelaw, who declined to take his seat. The first business disposed to was the election of mayor. Messrs. Patrick Perkins and James Miller were nominated, the former being elected by a majority of two votes. The mayor-elect having briefly thanked the councillors for the honour conferred upon him, the usual routine business was disposed of, and the meeting terminated.

What may bappen to a candidate for a seat in the Alexandra Shire Council was forcibly brought to light on Tuesday last. Mr Whitelaw, who had, after a warm contest, been elected for the Darlingford Riding of the Alexandra Shire, was returning home on Tuesday last per Cobb & Co.'s mail coach, but after getting to Knowles's punt, was refused a passage over the Goul. burn either in the punt or boat. Captain Bance and Mr Patrick Perkins, fellow-passengers in the coach, together with the mailman and mails, were conveyed over in the small boat, and Mr Whitelaw was left on the bank of the river, either to act like Casar and Cassins, and "leap into the angry flood and swim to yonder point," or travel beck two miles, hire a horse, and ride round by the Acheron bridge, a distance of 20 miles. He wisely preferred the latter course, and got into Alexandra where he was received with cheers, a report of the stoppage having preceded him by his fellow-passengers in the coach. Mr Knowles might have got credit for a clever election dodge if he had anchored the punt out in the middle of the Goulburn, as Mr Whitelaw was on his way up, and kept him there till the election was over, but this paltry act of vindictiveness after the contest was over, because Mr Knowles did not get bis candidate, Mr Henry Perkine, returned, is unworthy of any man, and we question whether a Chinaman or Aborizinal would have been guilty of anvthing so contemptible. We may mention that an attempt was made to stop Mr Whitelaw on his way up, but it did not succeed.

Death of Thomas Perkins in 1876

In reterence to Mr Thomas Perkins, whose death we announced last week, we extract the following from the Tooscomba Chronicle of the 12th August:— "It is with teelings of the deepest regret that we have to record the sudden and untimely death of Mr Thomas Perkins - a gentleman who was with us but a few hours ago in the full vigor of manhood—an enterprising fellow townsman. So sudden and unexpected has been the calamity, that even as we write we can scarcely realise the fact of his death. The gloom that rests on ourselves pervades the town, and from all sides we hear expressions of genuine sorrow at the sad disaster which deprived a fellow creature of his life and Toowoomba of one of its best and most cheriehed citizens. On Thursday hast Mr Perkins left Toowoomba by first train for Grandchester, and proceeded from there to Franklyn Vale. He was returning on herseback from the latter place at halfpast five in the evening to eatch at Grandchester the night train to Toowoomba, when, from the action of the horse, he was brought violently in contact with a tree, death resulting instantaneously. A little boy was with him at the time, intending to return to Franklyn Vale with the horse Mr Perkins was riding. we can scarcely realise the fact of his death. The lad immediately rode to Grandchester, and re The lad immediately rode to Grandchester, and reported the sad occurrence to the station master, who obtained the services of three mea, and sent them with the bay to where the accident occurred, about two miles distant. At 7 o'clock they reached Grandchester with the body. On its strival all was done that could be done by the station master and Mrs Cook, and telegrams were immediately sent conveying the mournful intelligence to his friends at Brisbane and Trowcomba. Mr Perkins arrived at Trowcomba in 1869, and as the managing represent Toowoomba in 1869, and as the managing representative of Mesers Perkins and Co., established the Toowoomba in 1809, and as the managing representative of Mesers Perkins and Co., established the Toowoomba Brewery, now the largest and most flourishing of our local industries, and which, by giving an impetus to the cultivation of barley—a crop that was hardly ever grown before—largely promoted the prosperity of our resident farmers. In various ways he has assisted in the progress and advancement of the district, in fact, his heart was thoroughly in Toowoomba, and he had made up his mind to invest all his capital here. In private life he was a warmhearted generous friend. The sunshine of prosperity or the sombre cloud of adversity made no difference with his friendship. He had the happy gift of making all who were intimately acquainted with him feel his thorough heartiness and sincerity, and hence he has left a wide circle of friends to mourn his untimely end. His brother, Mr Patrick Perkins, was in Brisbane at the time of the accident, and arrived at Grandchester by special train yesterday arrived at Grandchester by special train yesterday morning. In concluding our notice of the deceased, we may state that both he and his brother have been we may state that both he and his brother have been largely engaged in promoting the mining interests of this and the other colonies. In 1859 they gave £8000 for a share in a quartz mine at Reedy Creek, and from that day to the present they have been engaged in mining enterprise of large extent. In Queensland mining, and also in its pastoral pursuits, the late Mr Perkins took a lively interest, and he has on many occasions when in Victoria drawn the attention of Melbourne capitalists to the profitable fields of investment presenting themselves in this colony. of investment presenting themselves in this colony. Many have followed his advice, and have had no reason to regret it. Mr Perkins was 35 years of

DEATH OF THE HON. P. PERKINS.

received on Friday week from Melbourne reports the death yet another old Queens-Hon. Patrick Perkins, M.L.C., at Hawthorne. Ot late Mr. Perkins has taken no very active part in public affairs; but both in political and social circles his name in past years has been a prominent one. Mr. Perkins was born in Cashel County, Tipperary, Ireland, in 1838, so that at the time of his death he was 63 years of age. He came out to Victoria with his father and brothers as a very young man, and gained experience both on Bendigo and Ballarat, where his speculations proved highly successful. His first enterprise as a brewer was undertaken in partnership with his brother, the late Mr. Thomas Perkins, with whom he started breweries in both Victoria and Queensland. It was in 1876 that Mr. P. Perkins took up his residence in Queensland, controlling his large brewerles in Brisbane and Toowoomba, and entering into political life, besides attending to his mining and real property investments. In the year he was elected a member for the Legislative Assembly. He had the honour of holding the portfolio of Minister for Lands in the first M'llwraith Ministry, from 1879 to 1888, and his chief had a very high opinion of his work in that capacity. Mr. Perkins occupied a prominent place in the Legislative Assembly, representing Aubigny, and afterwards Cambooya, and on his defeat he was called to the Upper House. He retired from active partner-ship some time after the flotation of his business into a company under the title of Perkins and Co., Limited, and has since devoted much attention to large coal mining interests which he held in West Moreton. He has passed away after a varied and, on the whole, highly successful career, and it may at least be said of him that to the qualities of a shrewd business man be united those of a warm-hearted friend, and ready helper to those who appealed to him in time of need.
