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

## WALLABY BAY WALK TRACK

Name: Location:

Managed:

Wallaby Bay Walk Track Coller Bay to Stone Bay Lake Eildon National Park Parks Victoria Wallaby Bay Walk Track runs from Wallaby Bay in the Fraser Block of Lake Eildon National Park into Stone Bay and beside the amazing Stone's Outstation and stockyards.



Long before white settlement was established in the area once known as Devil's River, Aborigines occupied the surrounding hills and river flats in large numbers. However their numbers declined sharply within the first 30 years of white settlement. Early white settlers such as the Merlo and Stone families selected land in areas now submerged or near the bank of Lake Eildon. Stone's Outstation and Stone's stockyards are both located on land first selected by the Stone family and just above the lake's high water line.

## WALLABY BAY WALK TRACK

Stone's Outstation is located on Station Creek, around 100 metres above the high water mark of Lake Eildon. It is located in a flat clearing 50 metres from Station Creek. Stone's stockyards are located 100 metres further west from the Outstation.

The site is managed by Parks Victoria and is described in the Lake Eildon National Park Management Plan (2009 update):

**DESCRIPTION:** "Stone's outstation and stockyards near Station Creek is a well preserved site of regional or State significance. The stone fences on Steep and Pinnacle Tracks are relatively difficult to access but are an interesting feature."

**AIM:** "Investigate the development of interpretive facilities at Stone's outstation and stockyards near Station Creek in conjunction with the development of an expanded day walk network in that block."

## TIMELINE

Mid to late 1800s	The original Stone's Outstation was constructed by the Stone family. It is likely this hut is not the current hut.
18 November 2007	Stone's Outstation hut was upgraded by volunteers of the AURLO (Australian Land Rover Owners) huts team in partnership with Parks Victoria, Department of Sustainability and Environment and the Victorian High Country Huts Association. See first page of log book for members and comments from the team.
1997 - 2009	The Parks Victoria 'Lake Eildon National Park Management Plan (1997 and 2009) describes the site and site aim:
	<b>DESCRIPTION:</b> "Stone's outstation and stockyards near Station Creek is a well preserved site of regional or State significance. The stone fences on Steep and Pinnacle Tracks are relatively difficult to access but are an interesting feature."
	<b>AIM:</b> "Investigate the development of interpretive facilities at Stone's Outstation and stockyards near Station Creek in conjunction with the development of an expanded day walk network in that block."
15 January 2011	An unknown team of volunteers did basic work on the hut in association with the <u>Victorian High Country Huts</u> <u>Association</u> .
22 April 2015	Artworkz photoshoot of the Outstation and stockyards. Access was by boat - captained by Ian Faulks.
7 May 2015	Artworkz commenced work on this factsheet.
29 April 2015	A geocache went live at the site - making history as the first geocache ever located at the historic outstation.

The track is in good condition, however the number of trees fallen across the track is of concern. Someone has built rudimentary ramps over some of the fallen trees logs and these are hard to cross safely. We especially found them dangerous on the return walk when our angles and legs were very tired. Thankfully they were not wet.



There are signs of maintenance that has recently been carried out along the track. The bottom left image shows such maintenance while the bottom right image shows that a wombat has also tried to perform track maintenance, however his is unlikely to pass inspection.


It is great to see the Outstation is known about and used by such groups. We hope to build upon this knowledge and establish it even more solidly in peoples memories, as this is a substantial tourism attraction for our district and one that is worthy of a visit.





In 2015 the first geocache to ever be located near the outstation was placed. Within two weeks this geocache was complimented by a series of caches along the Wallaby Bay Walk Track. These in turn complimented a number placed 2014. Having a series of geocaches along a walk track creates extra incentive for geocachers to walk those tracks.

The location is perfect for geocaches, as it is not an area that would normally fall strongly onto the tourism radar. However, with the advent of Geocaching in Australia, and Australia's first GeoTour being launched late last year around Lake Eildon, it was the perfect time to add to the GeoTour with a set of lakeside caches for those who have access to a boat or love walking into less visited areas. This series of six geocaches were all active by early May.
