California Redwoods Binns Road, near Beech Forest Great Otway National Park Parks Victoria S38.667389, E143.579361 In 1938, an experimental stand of California Redwood (<u>sequoia</u> <u>sempervirens</u>) trees was planted along Binns Road, near the small township of Beech Forest in the Otway Ranges. It remains today.



In 1938, an experimental stand of California Redwood (sequoia sempervirens) trees was planted along Binns Road, near the small township of Beech Forest in the Otway Ranges. These remain today and have now grown to over 60 metres. The stand is now a part of the Great Otway National Park and is managed by Parks Victoria. The site includes a carpark area, picnic table and basic signage. The lovely Aire river runs through the stand which is downstream from the popular Hopetoun Falls. It is foreseen that the trees will double their height over the next 100 years, making them some of the worlds highest trees.

TIMELINE

1938 A stand of California Redwoods (*sequoia sempervirens*) was planted along Binns Road, near the township of Beech Forest in the Otway Ranges.
Unknown The California Redwood Stand was incorporated into the Great Otway National Park and subsequently became protected from tree felling.





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

We took a large number of photographs before heading back to the car and driving five minutes up the road to the Hopetoun Falls. They are one of my favourite Victorian waterfalls (behind Snobs Creek and Steavenson Falls of course) and they did not fail to impress once again. The Otway Ranges are full of magical wonders!


