



Bee Hive Stores Beehive Stores Grant Street, Alexandra Circa 28 May 1869 The Beehive Store was a sales business located in Grant Street Alexandra, that ran from two different locations during its early years. It was initially owned by businessman George Jobson.



The 'Beehive Stores' (or 'Bee Hive Stores' as it was originally advertised as in Alexandra) is a name synonymous with the early township. Though it is also synonymous with other towns in Australia and even abroad - where the name was commonly used. Locally, the original Alexandra Bee Hive Stores was first advertised at a different location to the current National Australia Bank site, where many people will remember it being.

HISTORY



On 28 May 1869 George Jobson first advertised his 'Bee Hive Store' business in the Alexandra *Standard*. He was in business earlier than that however, as on 28 January 1869 Jobson took action in the Alexandra Police Court against Messrs. Hamea and Ashbee presumably - for failing to pay an account. The matter was subsequently withdrawn by Jobson, suggesting the debt was paid or forgiven.

Then in October 1871, the advertisements in the Alexandra & Yea Standard changed to show that the business was now operated by 'George Jobson & Co' (no longer just 'George Jobson'). At this time the business was being advertised as 'Bee Hive' not "Beehive" and advertisements tell s that Jobson & Co. was in a partnership with Robert Lloyd, a partnership that was later dissolved by May 1873.

The first Bee Hive store was not located on the site next to the Corner hotel (later known as the Commercial Hotel). At the time of the devastating Grant Street Fire in November 1872, it was reported in the Alexandra *Standard* that the fire ran from Hamea's Corner Hotel, through the public library (formerly Vining's Australia Hotel), the Union Bank,

Thomas Hall's general store, Buggy's Harp of Erin Hotel, Jack Levy's Montezuma Hotel, a saddlery, butcher's shop and several cottages. According to the *Standard*, it was then halted at the northern brick wall of Jobson's store.

Jobson owned the land and buildings on which the Public Library was operated by Mr Moon. The same building also housed Mr Raphael's auction rooms, and Mr Branch's mining office. Neither Jobson nor Moon were insured on that site as became evident after the Grant Street fire. During 1873 Jobson built a new brick building on that land (next to the Corner Hotel, which was also re-erected in brick following the fire).



Throughout 1873 and into early 1874 Jobson advertised Clearing Sales to presumably reduce his stock before moving into his newly constructed building. (As mentioned above, the Jobson/Lloyds partnership had already collapsed around May 1873). The building itself was completed (or substantially so) by December 1873, as the Corner Hotel used it for it's Christmas Season Ball & Dinner and in June 1874 the building was used by the Hospital for a fund-raising ball. This likely indicates that Jobson had not moved into his new building at this time. He was continuing to advertise the 'Bee Hive' business, suggesting he was still trading from his original building. As is evident from advertisements, on Saturday 26 September 1874 John Cronin took over the business and begun trading in the new location. Cronin had previously operated a store on the opposite side of Grant Street, close to the UT Creek, which was itself destroyed by fire shortly prior to him purchasing Jobson's new Beehive building.

In building the new premises, Jobson had run into financial difficulties and had been declared insolvent. Eventually though, he returned to Alexandra after a short period, as the licensee of the Belle Vue Hotel at Johnson's Creek and also opened a general store near where the Shire Hall is today.

On 17 August 1877, James Leckie purchased the Beehive building and business from John Cronin and ran it in the same manner as Cronin. It is stated in the Alexandra & Yea Standard 18 August 1877 that John Cronin "would hereby tender his thanks to his numerous supporters for the last ten years, and hopes that they will give his successor a fair share of their patronage in the future". An article much later in the Alexandra & Yea Standard (December 1901) stated how the business was known as 'Leckie's'.

In the Alexandra & Yea Standard 21 December 1900, an article advises that the Beehive Store was now run by Mr. Ellis. It describes the stores collections of goods as including "drapery, groceries and wines and spirits... The drapery department contains some lovely dress materials, Manchester goods of sterling quality, fancy goods, lace goods of exquisite beauty, gloves, ribbons, new hosiery, clothing &c., while the groceries and tinned goods kept are fresh and of the very best quality, and marked at bedrock prices.".

In December 1901 an article in the Alexandra & Yea Standard titled 'Around the Shops' describes how before Mr. Ellis had the Beehive and that it was known as 'Leckies', (confirming that the Leckie family ran the business for a period of time).

In the Alexandra & Yea Standard 14 February 1908, Mr E. White advertised that he had purchased the Beehive Stores business from Mr E. White. He then started advertising the business under his name.

Robert Jackson Briggs had taken over the business by 1914 and operated it successfully until a post-war downturn in patronage and other business pressures resulted in him taking on two partners (Fred Marden and Bill Hurrey). The business arrangements meant that Mr. Briggs was largely left to run his side of the business (in the right side of the building) and the Marsden's ran their side of the business (in the left side of the building) A doorway in the wall between the two shops allowed for customers to navigate a few stops to move from the Brigg's side down to the Marsden's side of the business. Under the new partnership arrangement Mr Hurray concentrated on the grocery side of the business and mostly took over the shop's office. This new partnership also afforded Mr. Briggs time to focus on family and his other local interests. In 1954 the partners redesigned the front of the Beehive Stores building - giving it a newer and more modern facade.

On 3 March 1960, Robert Briggs died. After his death the partners consolidated the

business. In September 1959 Bill Hurray became ill and his ability to operate effectively in the partnership came to an end. The Marden's then took over the business effective 1 July 1960 and the Hurray's retired to Melbourne that same year.

On 30 November 1969, a two page brochure written by Joan Marden was included with every issue of the Alexandra & Yea Standard sold that week. The brochure covered the early years of Alexandra and gave a history of the Beehive Stores past. Thanks to the benefits of universal access to early newspapers via the National Library of Australia, we have been able to build upon this lovely historic record even further.

Fred Marden died in 1971 and his wife Joan sold the grocery and liquor side of the business the same year to the Partnership of 'Werner Witte and Lindsay Coate'. Joan Marden, her daughter Jenny and son-in-law Ian Napier then relocated the drapery side of the business to 99 Grant Street (later purchased by Bev Dunn in 1977 and became known as the 'Shoppe'). The Shoppe was located first at 99 Grant Street, then 76 Grant Street, then 106 Grant Street. Joan Marden later moved to Melbourne where she later remarried an importer of fine linen.

In 1973 Norm and Margot Reddrop purchased the business and leasehold from 'Werner Witte and Lindsay Coate' and commenced public trading on 5 February 1973. They took the business in a different direction by moving away form the general store/part supermarket model the business had been built on since the 1800s, instead moving to a dedicated supermarket format.

In 1987, after several unsuccessful attempts to purchase the freehold of the Beehive Stores, Norm and Margot gave up and purchased the former 'G.E. Courtney Motors' garage located on the opposite side of Grant street and further south (102 Grant Street). This building was larger, offered greater opportunity for expansion and had better and flatter rear access for trucks and delivery vans.

'Werner Witte and Lindsay Coate' sold the leasehold of the store to the National Australia Bank (NAB). However the freehold is still held as of 2019 by a descendant of Robert Briggs—Mrs Marjory Wallis. Previous to this, the NAB Bank had been located further north (on the same side of Grant Street) in the old double storey brick building on the corner of Downey and Grant Streets. Upon gaining occupancy, the NAB renovated the Beehive building and they have occupied the building since.

HISTORY

On the 15 December 2015 the Alexandra branch of the ANZ Bank (located further south and on the same side of the street as the Beehive Stores building) closed their door. As the banking industry continues to change, it is possible that other banks in Alexandra may follow suit and close their doors. However, at the time of the writing, there is no indication that the National Australia Bank has any plans of closing its Alexandra branch - located in the former Beehive Stores building.

28 January 1869	Mr Jobson took action in the Alexandra Police Court against Messrs. Hamea and Ashbee (presumably for a failure to pay a bill). The matter was withdrawn.
28 May 1869	The first advertisement for the Beehive store appeared in the <i>Alexandra Times</i> under the ownership of George Jobson.
October 1871	Advertisements now carried the '& Co' label on Beehive advertisements in the Alexandra Standard as Jobson has entered into a partnership with Robert Lloyd.
November 1872	The Grant Street Fire was halted at Jobson's original store.
April 1873	The partnership with Robert Lloyd was dissolved. This was advertised in the <i>Alexandra Times</i> and mention made of moving to the new property beside the Corner Hotel.
1873	Jobson built a new building on land he owned and where the Public Library previously stood before the Grant Street fire gutted it. He ran clearing sales advertisements in the Alexandra Standard for the contents of the shop he was moving out of.
December 1873	The Corner Hotel used the new building for a Christmas Ball and Dinner event, suggesting Jobson had not moved into it at this time.
June 1874	The new building was used by the Hospital for a fund-raising ball, suggesting Jobson had not moved into it at this time. He was however continuing to advertise the Beehive Store business at this time, suggesting he was still operating from his other premises.
26 September 1874	John Cronin tool over the Beehive Store business in the new building and commenced operations Saturday 26 September 1874.

17 August 1877	James Leckie purchased the business from John Cronin in the building known as the Beehive Stores. His store was called 'Leckie's'.
21 December 1900	The Beehive Stores business was being run by Mr Ellis.
20 December 1901	Leckie's mentioned in the Alexandra <i>Standard</i> as the former owners of the Beehive Stores in an advert published by Ellis.
14 February 1908	A notice in the Alexandra <i>Standard</i> for Mr E. White advised the local community that he had purchased the Beehive Stores business from Mr Ellis.
April 1909	The earliest advertisement for 'White' was published in the Alexandra Standard.
April 1914	By April 1914, Robert Briggs (a New Zealand born businessman) had taken over the Beehive Stores business according to advertisements in the Alexandra Standard.
26 June 1934	Thieves unsuccessfully tried to break into the Beehive Stores. They gave up when confronted with the electrical alarm wires.
1946	Robert J. Briggs entered into partnership with Fred Marden and Bill Hurrey.
3 March 1960	Robert J. Briggs died.
1 July 1960	Fred & Joan Marden purchased the business from other partners (four months after the death of R. J. Briggs).
30 November 1967	A two page brochure written by Joan Marden was included with every issue of the Alexandra <i>Standard</i> sold that week. The brochure covered the early years of Alexandra and gave

a history of the Beehive Stores past. Thanks to the benefits of universal access to early newspapers via the National Library of Australia, we now know that elements of the history are incorrect, however at the time it was widely received and has an important place in the history of the Beehive stores.

Fred Marden died and his wife Joan sold the grocery and liquor side of the business to the partnership of 'Werner Witte and Lindsay Coate'.

1971 Joan Marden, her daughter Jenny and son-in-law Ian Napier relocated the drapery side of the business to 99 Grant Street (later purchased by Bev Dunn in 1977 and became known as the 'Shoppe'). The Shoppe was located first at 99 Grant Street, then 76 Grant Street, then 106 Grant Street.

> The partnership of 'Werner Witte and Lindsay Coate' sold the business and leasehold to Norm & Margot Redrop who converted the business into a supermarket.

Joan moved to Melbourne and married a linen importer.

Norm and Margot Reddrop purchased 102 Grant Street (the former 'G.E. Courtney Motors' located on the western side of Grant Street) and set up as a supermarket, which runs to this day.

Unknown The partnership of 'Werner Witte and Lindsay Coate' sold the Beehive Stores business to the National Australia Bank (NAB). The freehold is still held by a descendant of Robert Briggs.









THE ALEXANDRA ATHENÆUM.

The formal opening of this commodious and substantial building took place on Monday night last by a grand amat-ur perform-ance. The large hall was den-ely crowded, and many who had purchased tickets were unable to obtain adm t ance. There certainly has never been such a gathering in Alexandra for numbers and respectability. The hall is 150 test in length and 30 feet in breadth, the walls being of brick and the root of iron. the acoustic properties of the house are remarkably good. The walls have been ornamented with paintings on the plaster of persons, flowers, do, giving a pleasant, lively appearance to the main body of the building. A commodious stage with wing walls has been erected, and a neat prosening. The scenery has been got up with great faste and ability, certainly far superior to anything of the kind we have ever seen out of Melbourne. The storm at sea, the ships, boats, thunder, lightning, and numerous other effects were remarkably good, and called forth the ad-miration and wonder of the audience Mr Charles Hames, who painted the scenery, has a remarkable tasts and talent for this kind of art

The performance commenced by all the company appearing on the first rising of the curtain, and minging in a highly creditable manner, "God Save the Queen." Mr John Whitelaw next came on the stage and delivered the following prologue, which was well received by the audience :---

This was followed by the little farce of "No. I, Round the Corner," which was well played by Mr Norman Whitelaw and Mr Walter G. Moon, who kept the audience in a good humor till its close. The curtain then rose on "The Dream at Sea," the cele-brated drama by J. B. Buckstone, which was the great event of the evening. Mr N. Whitelaw was well made up as Trevannion and well sustained the character throughout Mr Charles flames, who always plays well, performed the part of Launos Lynwood to perfection, and Mr A. Hames as Black Balph did the rinfian business splendidly. Mr H. M. Taylor's Alley Croaker kept the house in M. Taylor's Alley Croaker kept the nouse in roars of laughter, and as Tom Tinkle, the muffin man, Mr Long was immense, his make up being especially good. Mr W. B.
