

Name: Planted: By: Uncovered: Alexandra Time Capsule 1891 Alexandra Standard workers March 2005 In March 2005 a time capsule bottle was found hidden in a wall cavity at the Alexandra Library. The capsule was uncovered when a section of brick wall was removed to make way for a door.




In March 2005, a time capsule (bottle containing notes) was discovered by construction workers at the Alexandra Library. The bottle was found hidden between two walls on the northern side of the Alexandra Library building. This wall was constructed 1891 as part of the second library extension - which saw the Library double its useable floor space. The extension abutted the wall of the Alexandra Standard Office which was located between the library and the UT Creek. Prior to 1891 the library (located on the corner of Grant and Perkins Streets) only consisted of the right 1883 section of building.

As 1891 was the date shown on notes found in the bottle, the theory developed that the capsule was hidden during the 1891 construction phase of the second extension to the library. What is currently considered most plausible is that staff working at the Alexandra Standard Office noticed a dead space in the wall being built beside them and hatched a plan to hide a bottle containing handwritten notes in the space (as a time capsule for someone in the future to find). Then, later in March 2005 the bottle and notes were located when the wall was being partly dismantled to make way for an archway - allowing passage between the second extension (built 1891) and the new third extension built 2004/05.



On Wednesday 9 March 2005 after the discovery of the time capsule, the Alexandra & Yea Standard published an article highlighting the amazing discovery. It described how the demolition of a section of the Library Wall (to make an archway) led to the discovery and mentioned how other items were found during construction works around the site. It described the contents of the 1891 time capsule as four handwritten pieces of paper in an old glass bottle. These notes are reproduced later in this factsheet.

Other items found at the library work site (dated in the mid 1900s) included:

- Two glass ink bottles.
- One clay ink bottle.
- One clag bottle.
- A printers block (Cooke's Motors Grant Street Alexandra, Phone 174).
- Two glass Louvre window panes with advertising stickers on them.

One of the glass Louvre advertising stickers was advertising the 1969 Centenary of Alexandra and another the 1959 Alexandra Billy Cart Derby. You can download the

The old wooden Standard Office building where these creative workers laboured during 1891 was demolished circa 1968 and the Alexandra Standard business which had operated from there for decades moved further north to their new premises at 45 Grant Street.

Today the time capsule, three glass ink bottles and one clay ink bottle are kept in safe storage at the Alexandra Library. Artworkz were made aware of the time capsule and its contents 29 March 2016 by Library officer Libby Kotschet. We then conducted a photoshoot of the items and commenced work on this factsheet the following morning.

While many of the questions surrounding this amazing find now



have plausible answers, we have not been able to identify the label on the bottle above. If you have any ideas or information on this bottle's contents and the label, please let us know. We would love to include the full label for our readers.

Interestingly, while this time capsule is one of the earliest time capsules buried in Alexandra, it is not the oldest. This title is given to the <u>St. John's Church who buried a</u> time capsule under the foundation stone of their original church built on the corner of Webster and Nihil Streets in January 1868, decades earlier.

1883	The Alexandra Library was built.
1891	A second extension to the Alexandra Library was built.
5 March 1891	A time capsule was likely placed in the northern wall of the Alexandra Library's second extension during construction.
6 March 1891	The issue of the Alexandra and Yea Standard dated Friday 6 March 1891 carried no obvious mention of the time capsule or secret code as far as we have been able to ascertain.
c1968	The Alexandra Standard Office was demolished.
1969	Alexandra celebrated its Centenary.
2004-2005	A third extension was built onto the Alexandra Library on land where the wooden Alexandra Standard building once stood and the 'Alexandra Standard' had been printed for may decades.
2004	A Time Capsule hidden 1891 was discovered by workers removing bricks from the northern wall of the second extension of the Alexandra Library to form a large archway.
9 March 2005	The Alexandra & Yea Standard published at article on the discovery of the Time Capsule in their Wednesday issue.
29 March 2016	Libby Kotschet of the Alexandra Library made us aware of the time capsule and where it was found. Photos were taken with an iPhone to be replaced with better images once a professional photoshoot could be organised.
30 March 2016	Artworkz commenced work on this factsheet.
31 May 2016	Artworkz featured the time-capsule during its HistoryCafe night at the Alexandra Library in front of 40 people and the Shire of Murrindindi Chief Executive Officer Margaret Abbey. This was significant as it was our largest standard HistoryCafe to-date.
6 June 2016	Artworkz was shown a photo of the building of the second Alexandra Library extension 1891, showing men constructing the

front of the Library extension and the double brick wall from the outside - where the time capsule bottle had been hidden around a month earlier based on the progress of the building.

10 June 2016




GRANT STREET ALEXANDRA

The Alexandra Free Library and the Standard Machine Printing Works circa 1910.






