

James Abomady was a businessman and managed the Alexandra Picture Theatre as well as trying his hand at photography and running a small photographic studio in the early 1900s.



Early life

Jamiel 'James' Abomady was the son of 'George' Said Abomady (also known as Charley or George Kamey). George, an Egyptian native, who married Badea (d1923 at her home in Hawthorn), and they had two children, Jamiel and Zarefa. In 1903 George opened a Jewelers and Watchmakers shop beside Wheelers Chemist in Grant Street, Alexandra, and it was reported that he had been a travelling salesman in the district for the twelve years prior. He then purchased the Taylor and draper business from Mr Angel in 1905 when his first advertisement appeared in the Alexandra Standard, using the surname 'Abommaday' and stating he was better known as Charlie Kamey.

In April 1905 George ends advertising at Alexandra and advertising does not recommence until 16 April 1915. In 1912 we do however find George running a drapery shop in High Street Yea.

Then George re-appears in Alexandra in 1915, when he advertises in the <u>Alexandra Standard on 16 April 1915</u> that Abomady of High Street Yea, has taken over the premises of the Central Stores at Alexandra. Again it is stated that he is better known as Charley Kamey, however Charley is spelt differently in this advertisement as previously in 1905 it was spelt 'Charlie'. Then in an advertisement in the Alexandra Standard on 18 June 1915, he is now referring to his business as the Abomady's Central Store and no longer referring to his name Charlie Kamey. Then in April 1916 Abomady was now advertising the business as being removed to Alexandra. (<u>Yea Chronicle, Thursday 13 April 1916</u>).

Son James the photographer

While his son James was at Yea, he became an active photographer. The Yea Chronicle reported on 23 October 1912 that James had taken good snapshots at the opening of the Bowls season and had taken a flashlight photo at the Tennis Club Ball. It was then reported in the Yea Chronicle on 4 December 1912 that James had taken some 'exceedingly fine views of the falls and the group picture of those present is very distinct and will form a nice memento of the occasion.

In June 1915 James was elected as a <u>warden of the Anglesey Lodge I.O.O.F.</u> and in September 1915 he was elected <u>Secretary of the Yea Bowling Club</u>. In February 1916 he was <u>elected as Vice-Grand of the Anglesey Lodge I.O.O.F.</u>

Also in February 1916, a photograph of the new Roll of Honour at Yea was publishing in the 10 February 1916 issue of the Yea Chronicle and James was described as the being the photographer, of High Street, Yea. However it should be noted that we have not been able to identify and advertisements in the Yea Chronicle for photography business under his name or of him soliciting photographic business. It is therefore likely he was acting as a dedicated amateur photographer. James later moved to Alexandra and it was here that we find he was a member of the Grand United Order of Oddfellows, was a contributor to the Alexandra Cottage Hospital, was on the committee of the Alexandra Athletic Club and was a Vestry member of St. John's Church.

Driving charge

In May 1919 James was charged for <u>driving a motor vehicle with no lights</u>. Also charged for the same offence on the same court day were T Tossol, WG Robb, and Mr EN Stillman. Mr W S Newman was charged for not having a tail light, and J McGuigan was charged for not having lights on his car. The police were obviously making a big statement about lighting, even charging Mr James Baker for not having a light in front of his hotel on 27 March of that year. All of the above received fines.

James operated the Abomady Alexandra Café, later purchased by the Weinberg family and called the Weinberg Alexandra Café, which was located on the west side of Southern Grant Street.

He advertised and practiced as a photographer locally, and ran a small studio from his shop from 1917.

The Alexandra talkies

James was also involved in the motion picture movement at Alexandra from 1926. But we know that movies were shown at the Shire Hall on Monday nights from 1921 under the name 'Fowler's Pictures'.

The first advertised 'Fowler's' movie screening was 'Elsie Ferguson in The Witness for the Defence. and Robert Warwick in Mizzoura'. The following Monday was to see the screening of 'Why Change your Wife'. (<u>Alexandra Standard</u>, Friday 15 April 1921). The second 'Fowler's' movie screening advertised in the local newspaper was 'The Great Houdini in Terror Island' and 'Wallace Reid in The Dancin' Fool' (<u>Alexandra Standard</u>, Friday 15 July 1921). The following Monday was to see the screening of 'Old Wives for New'.

But James involvement saw the movies move to a new level at Alexandra. He managed the Alexandra Picture Theatre for a number of years from 1926, which was during the transitional period from silent to talking movies (talkies). In the Alexandra *Standard* on Friday 2 July 1926 he was described as being a proprietor, along with Mr McCashney. However as time went on, it becomes clear that Mr McCashney became less involved and Mr Abomady took a leading role in the operation of the theatre. The 1926 article informs the reader that the two men were able to keep costs to a minimum as the films

were obtained for free. Their only costs in these early days were the freight costs. They also did not charge for the use of their projector, and staff were volunteers, ensuring locals got cheap entertainment.

Sister Zarefa

James' only sister Zarefa, was a local school teacher at Alexandra. When she married Robert Allen Shepherd in 1926 at the Alexandra St. John's Church, the school parents and the St. John's Choir, both presented her with gifts for her excellent service. Her school children also performed a demonstration for the bride and Father Christmas gave her a special present at a pre-Christmas school event which Father Christmas attended. Zarefa and her husband settled in Quairading in Western Australia. While at Alexandra, she had been an organist at St. John's for a number of years.

James remarries

Also in 1926, James married Ida Catherine Collins. The Collins family were well established in Alexandra at that time and both of Ida's parents are buried in the Alexandra Cemetery. James and Ida had at least two children; Desmond Jamiel (born c1928) and James Collins (born c1933).

Today, photographs taken by James are extremely rare. One such photograph was of the members of St. John's Anglican Church at Alexandra believed to have been taken around 1916. James then placed the photograph on card with his logo visible on the bottom right. This photo appears in this factsheet and is one of only two known photos taken by James at Alexandra that we know to exist, and the only one to be published.

James operates men's apparel store

By 1936 James was operating a store specialising in men's apparel, located opposite the Alexandra Library in Grant Street. In that same year he took his family to Western Australia, where they lived in the vicinity of where his sister Zarefa and her husband Robert had settled.

Death of James

In October 1948 Mrs J Abomady travelled from Perth to Alexandra for a holiday with her sister Mrs Harry Wood (nee Collins). Just over five years later, James died on 8 March 1954 at Perth, W.A. Newspaper entries call him a <u>friend of the Western Australia film industry</u>. One entry was from the President and members of the Motion Picture Exhibitors Association of Western Australia, and another from the Reelers' Fraternity.

While better known as a photographer in Yea, he also practiced in Alexandra where he operated a small studio. Although he was recognised as a photographer locally, his greatest contribution was to the motion picture industry as an early cinema operator in both Regional Victoria and Western Australia.

James, Ida and their two children, are all memorialised at the Karrakatta Cemetery in Perth, W.A. where also his sister Zarefa and her husband Robert are both memorialised.

BASIC TIMELINE OF EVENTS

1837c

George Abomady was born. George was the father of James Abomady, later to be known as a photographer.

6 March 1903

George Abomady advertises he is opening a Jeweller and watchmaker store beside Wheeler's Chemist. (<u>Alexandra Standard</u>, Friday 6 March 1903).

23 October 1903

It was reported that George Abomady (Mr Kamey) was been involved in a horse accident and that he had been removed to the Mansfield hospital. It was reported that the horse he was driving was a very spirited one, and that when negotiating the hill a short distance from Mr Merlo's farm, something happened, Mr Kamey jumped out and let the horse go on its wild career. When Mr Kamey was found, he was in a state of collapse, much bruised and cut about he head, face and body. It was stated that the horse was in a similar condition to Mr Kamey and the conveyance was smashed to atoms. Mr Kamey was found by Mr Merlo and Stone who took him to the hospital. (*Alexandra Standard*, Friday 23 October 1903).

Aril 1905

First mention of George Abomady in local newspapers. (<u>Alexandra Standard</u>, Friday 24 March 1905). In this article it is mentioned that he is better known as Charlie Kamey and his name Abomady is spelt Abommaday.

7 March 1912

Mr Abomady of High Street, Yea is mentioned in the Yea Chronicle in relation to a 'startling announcement' to be made in the next issue. (*Yea Chronicle*, Thursday 7 March, 1912).

9 May 1912

Abomady's Clothing Store is operating from High Street, Yea. (*Yea Chronicle*, Thursday 9 May 1912). A later advertisement places the business two doors down from the Caledonian Hotel.

23 October 1912

While James was at Yea, he became an active photographer.



The Yea Chronicle reported on 23 October 1912 that he had taken good snapshots at the opening of the Bowls season and had taken a flashlight photo at the Tennis Club Ball.

4 December 1912

The Yea Chronicle reported that James had taken some 'exceedingly fine views of the falls and the group picture of those present is very distinct and will form a nice memento of the occasion. (*Yea Chronicle*, 4 December 1912).

16 April 1915

Abomad's of High Street, Yea have taken over the premises of the Central Stores at Grant Street, Alexandra. (Alexandra Standard, Friday 16 April 1915).

June 1915

James was elected as a warden of the Anglesey Lodge I.O.O.F. (Yea Chronicle, Thursday 3 June 1815).

18 June 1915

In an advertisement in the Alexandra *Standard* he now refers to his business as the 'Abomady's Central Store' and he no longer highlights his optional name Charlie Kamey. (Alexandra Standard, 18 June 1915).

16 July 1915

A Mr George Abomady, the father of James, is advertising his *Central Stores* business in Alexandra. He had moved into the premises adjoining the property previously occupied by 'Dihood and Son'. He stated he intends opening up a larger assortment of goods. (Alexandra *Standard*, Friday 16 July 1915). Dihood is only mentioned briefly in early local newspaper records in the period from September 1914 when he advertised he had returned to Alexandra, to mid 1915. He states that he is better known as Charley Kamey, however Charley is now spelt differently as previously in 1905 it was spelt 'Charlie'.

February 1916

James was elected as Vice-Grand of the Anglesey Lodge I.O.O.F. (*Yea Chronicle*, Thursday 3 February 1916).

10 February 1916

A photograph of the new Roll of Honour at Yea was publishing in the Yea Chronicle and James was described as the being the photographer, of High Street, Yea. However no evidence has been found to suggest James was operating a photographic business from High Street, Yea. It is likely he was simply acting as a dedicated amateur photographer. (Yea Chronicle, 10 February 1916).

13 April 1916

Abomady now advertising his business as being removed to Alexandra. (Yea Chronicle, Thursday 13 April 1916).

September 1915

James was elected Secretary of the Yea Bowling Club. (<u>Yea</u> Chronicle, Thursday 23 September 1915).

19 October 1917

James advertising his photographic business to mothers of children (specialising in children's portraiture).

9 March 1919

In a tongue-in-check piece in the Alexandra *Standard*, James is voted as the most obliging man in Alexandra. It is stated 'He always has a smile, and is only too willing to do anything to oblige, either with car or himself, especially anything for the pretty girls'. (Alexandra *Standard*, Friday 9 May 1919).

28 December 1923

Badea, wife of James, died at her home in Hawthorn.

17 December 1925

Zarefa, sister of James, received a gift from parents of the Alexandra State School during a Christmas event which saw Father Christmas also attended with gifts for the children. Her gift given during a presentation by Mrs Connell who spoke of the very high regard in which Miss Abomady was 'held by the parents and the care and affection she bestowed on the children'. This was prior to her being married and leaving for Western Australia early the following year. (Alexandra Standard, Friday 18 December 1925).

1926

James married Ida Catherine Collins.

17 February 1926

Mr Robert Allen Shepherd married Zarefa Abomady, the only daughter of George Abomady at St. John's Church in Alexandra. (Alexandra Standard, Friday 5 March 1926). An earlier article noted how her school children had given the bride a great demonstration outside the St. John's Church. (Alexandra Standard, Friday 19 February 1926).

19 July 1926

James, along with Mr McCashney, are described as proprietors of the Alexandra Pictures. (<u>Alexandra Standard</u>, <u>Friday 2 July 1926</u>)

20 August 1926

James is running the Alexandra Pictures. (<u>Alexandra Standard</u>, Friday 20 August 1926).

16 December 1927

James advertising his radio business and his wireless receiving sets. (<u>Alexandra Standard</u>, Friday 16 December 1927).

17 February 1928

George Abomady died aged 67 at Alexandra. (<u>Alexandra Standard</u>, Friday 17 February 1928).

25 August 1928

Film Corporation Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer (MGM) brought their Trackless Train to Alexandra on 25 August as part of a World Tour. It stayed Saturday and Sunday, leaving Monday. While in Melbourne, the Shrine of Remembrance Committee used the train to raise money.

c1916

A photograph of the members of St. John's Anglican Church at Alexandra was taken by James Abomady. It was then placed on card with his logo on the bottom right. This photo appears in this factsheet and is one of only two known photos taken by James to exist and the only one to be freely



published.

c1936 Around 1936 we find James operating a store specialising in

men's apparel opposite the Alexandra Library in Grant Street.

5 January 1937 James and two members of his family for Western Australia.

(Alexandra Standard, Friday 8 January 1937).

1 October 1948 The Alexandra Standard reported that Mrs J Abomady or

Standard, Friday 1 October 1948).

8 March 1954 James Abomady died at Perth, W.A. He was said to have

been a friend of the Western Australia film industry. (<u>The</u> West Australian, Thursday 11 March 1954). He was

cremated and memorialised at the Karrakatta Cemetery.

16 April 1954 An entry in the local newspaper reported the death of James

in Western Australia. (Alexandra Standard, Friday 16 April

1954).

1960 Robert Shepherd died in Perth aged 59. He was cremated at

the Karrakatta Cemetery in Western Australia.

1983 Zarefa Shepherd (nėe) Abomady, died aged 91 and was

cremated and memorialised at the Karrakatta cemetery in

Western Australia.

14 March 2018 Artworkz commenced work on this factsheet.



The Picture Night in aid of the special appeal of the Children's Hospital attracted a full house at the Shire Hall on Saturday last.
